


Dear Parents/Carers,





Year 8 & 9 Lee Valley Finals Indoor Athletics Cup

After qualifying from the semi-finals of the Lee Valley Indoor Athletics competition last week the Year 8 & 9 A team was back at Lee Valley on Wednesday 29th November to compete in the B finals. This competition consisted of the top 12 teams of the 44 that were entered in the first rounds, from across the whole of Essex and North London. Athletes compete in a variety of events, each scoring points for their team based on their position in the competition, which are collated to decide the top team at the end of the day. As always, the standard of competition was very high but our girls put their experience to good use and produced some excellent improvements from the previous rounds.

On the track Maya Baluka started the competition in the 60m hurdles and got our team off to a flying start with a time of 11.14s, which was very close to her personal best. Eve Boateng was next up with the 60m sprint, running an impressive 8.87s, setting a new personal best and gaining 3rd place overall and securing the team a further 3 points for their team total.

In the 800m, Ava Boucard showed excellent pacing and tactical awareness as she navigated her way around the track. She was competing against the top middle-distance runners in the county and managed to shave over 4 seconds off her previous time, gaining a new personal best of 2m48.0s. Millie Mansfield was next up on the track for the 200m race, blasting the competition away with a personal best time of 27.8s and beating the Grays Convent Year 8 200m record that she set two weeks ago!

Over at shot put Chidera Idika was back, dominating the competition and produced another new personal best of 10.05m, this is only 27cm off the Grays Convent School record for Year 9 so hopefully she can set a new record for this when the summer season starts in the spring. At High jump Winna Koho got back into the flow and produced a final jump that equalled her personal best of 1.35m. I am sure she has lots more to offer as well as she moves into the outdoor season after Easter. Millie Mansfield worked hard in the long jump competition, improving on her jump from last week, with a final jump of 4.12m, which although didn't beat her personal best, helped to secure vital points for the team. The final event of the evening was the 4 x 200m relays. It was an extremely thrilling race, the girls worked together to implement their tactics and knowledge, which paid off, improving upon their previous relay time and finishing 2nd in their competition.

At the end of the competition Grays Convent scored 39 points as a team, leaving them in 2nd place behind St Martins, who were crowned champions. This was one of the best performances that our Year 8 & 9 teams have achieved over the years at this competition and definitely makes me look forward to seeing them in action again when the outdoor season begins.

Thank you to Miss Sasse who was the team manager for the evening and to Ms Boller for supporting the team and helping with the officiating, as well as driving everyone home after an exhausting but exciting evening of Athletics.

District Cross Country - Champions 2023

Grays Convent High School Cross Country team competed in the District Cross Country competition at Blackshots on Thursday 30th November and produced some good performances.

Myleene Pham, in Year 7 got off to a fantastic start in her 1,950m race and looked strong throughout. She kept up with the front of the pack from the whistle and maintained a comfortable running style. It was a battle to the finish line, where she fought hard to keep her position and finally finished in 4th position. Close behind her were Eberechuku Nwachokor in 16th, Kaylah Onukwube in 18th, Ariyelle Bourne in 19th and Adeola Thompson in 20th. Along with Joanne, Ula, Nadia, Malvina and Dollie who made up the rest of the team, the Grays Convent Year 7 team finished with a team total of 100 points, meaning they were crowned this year's Thurrock School Champions, with Gable Hall finishing in 2nd place on 154 points and Harris Ockendon in 3rd place with 178 points.

In the year 8 and 9 competition Mollie Garner led the way for the Grays Convent team, working hard throughout the race to finish in 12th place. Our next runner in was Millie Mansfield who finished in 14th, closely followed by Marissa Mudzuri in 18th position. Unfortunately, the team did not secure a place in the top three for their age category this year, finishing in 5th position.

The inter girls' competition was dominated by the Grays Convent team from start to finish. Sophie Pasztor ran an outstanding race, leading from the start but closely followed by Isobel Pitney. Tactical pacing from Isobel saw her time a perfect kick to overtake Sophie on the final stretch and win the competition. The next runner home was Erin Pitney in 3rd position and Maeve Pitney in 7th. All four of these girls made the selection for the Thurrock team who will be competing in the Essex Schools Cross Country championships in January. There was also excellent running from the rest of the team who all completed the race in the top 32 positions. This outstanding performance saw the Inter girls crowned District Champions at the end of the competition, finishing ahead of William Edwards who finished in 2nd place and St Cleres who finished 3rd overall.


Overall in the combined girl's competition Grays Convent finished 1st in the District, with William Edwards in 2nd place and St Cleres who were 3rd Place.



Jesus is knocking on the door of our hearts and we are the innkeepers who can open the door and let him in.


In our busy lives, let us make space and time for Jesus.



We have our Advent Wreath in school and this is what it symbolises: Circle – God is without end.

- Evergreen foliage His love is everlasting
- Purple for Repentance. It's the Liturgical colour for Advent.
- Holly sharp prickles Jesus nailed to the cross,
- Red berries The blood of Jesus, for the forgiveness of sins
- Candles the Light of Christ. We light more candles each week because the Light of Christ grows nearer and nearer to Christmas. There are 3 purple candles, one pink and one white.
- Pink is for Rejoicing on the 3rd Sunday of Advent
- White is for Christmas Day for Jesus, Light of the World

The girls are encouraged to have a cosy prayer corner at home and to spend a few minutes quietly in God's presence each day. They may choose to read the Jesse Tree bible stories, some of which we will be following in school from Genesis, and the stories of Jesus' birth in St Luke's Gospel.

What Schools Need to Know about

WHAT THE ACT WILL DO The Online Safety Act was passed into UK law in October 2023, with the aim of establishing major new layers of protection for children when they re-online. The government has pledged "a zero-tolerance approach to protecting children from online harm"— and the act certainly includes more powerful legislation which should help to safeguard young people in the digital world. Our guide summarises the key points for schools …

HARMFUL CONTENT

Social media sites must rapidly remove illegal and/or harmful content and/or harmful content such as bullying or harassing comments; pornography; and content that supports extremist activity or encourages or depicts violence, suicide, self harm or eating disorders. If they fail to do so, they can be fined up to 10% of their global revenue while their executives may even face iail time.

animal cruelty

Content featuring cruelty to animals is now prohibited, even if it originates from abroad (where the law may be different). Again, it is the platform's responsibility to remove this.

MORE TRANSPARENCY

Sites must be transparent about the hazards that any children using them could encounter – by publishing risk assessments for their platforms, for instance.

HOSTING MISLEADING adverts

ams and fraudulent adverts must be blocked or removed, or the hosting companies are liable to be fined. NON-CONSENSUAL SHARING

It's now easier to convict online abusers or people who share intimate images without consent, while legislation on the criminality of deepfakes has been clarified. deeprakes has been clantied. The new laws also relate to any individuals who even threaten to share such images. This should help to protect women and girls in particular online.

REPORTING AND FILTERING

Sites should have easy reporting mechanisms for children (or their porents and carers) to flag up problems quickly. They must also provide options to filter out unwanted

AGE-RESTRICTED MATERIAL

Sites must prevent children from accessing age-inappropriate material. This includes enforcing age limits and implementing robust

What this means for you

The act has some specific implications for schools: it's essential that leaders understand the new legislation's scope and limitations. The act is certainly a positive step, but as artificial intelligence and other advances in tech continue to produce new challenges, schools will still need to remain extremely vigilant.

KNOW WHERE TO GET HELP

Look out for the Code of Conduct that Ofcom is creating in response to the Online Safety Act. Note that the new legislation doesn't mean an instant change: many of its elements will only come into force at the end of 2023. An Ofcom consultation on 'protecting people from illegal harms online' will be running until February 2024.

REMEMBER THE ESSENTIALS

Remain mindful of your organisation's own online activities: the legal duty for schools to maintain appropriate software monitoring and filtering, for example, will not change.

WATCH FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

There are some issues on which the legislation remains less clear for now: whether it's possible for Ofcom to scan encrypted private messages (such as on WhatsApp) has yet to be resolved, for instance – making this an area where, for the moment, young people have less legal protection.

UNDERSTAND AND EXPLAIN

Staff should learn how to raise concerns with tech companies whose platforms an should learn how to raise concerns with tech companies whose plates into anything upsetting or unpleasant. Students also need to be made vare of the newly strengthened laws relating to cyber-bullying, xting or posting inappropriate content. Young people do make istakes online – so the clearer their understanding of the possible insequences, the better.

ENGAGE WITH PARENTS

Schools should also explain to parents and carers the new possibilities that the Online Safety Act affords them in terms of protecting their children. Many parents may have previously felt that there was little they could do about changing online platforms' content; they now have a far greater level of support when complaining about a company or the behaviour of an individual.






