Dear Parents/Carers,


Last Sunday was Peace Sunday and at my assembly this week we launched the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity that follows.

The theme this year is, 'Go and Do Likewise', the moral of the story of the Good Samaritan. The prayers and reflections have been prepared this year by Christian churches in Burkina Faso - an area of the world still experiencing a serious security crisis. Solidarity is emerging between Christians, Muslim and traditional religions to find lasting solutions for peace, social cohesion and reconciliation.

The parable of the Good Samaritan is one of the best-known passages of Scripture, yet one that never seems to lose its power to challenge indifference to suffering and to inspire solidarity. In prayers on Monday, Martin Luther King Jr day, we considered how King who heard that call to 'Go and do likewise'.

How words speak for themselves:



At mass we share the words, 'Peace be with you', and answer 'And also with you'. We pass to each other that gift of peace

that Jesus gave us at his death: 'Peace I leave with you, my peace I give you'.

Father Stephen said something so powerful at mass last week, that it has stayed with me. "If someone was walking down the street persecuting Christians, would there be enough evidence of your Christianity to persecute you."

Peace be with you this week, 'go and do likewise'.







Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity - 18th-25th January 2024

This week in our Form Prayers we have reflected on how Christians of all denominations are already united in the one Body of Christ and one family of God through our Baptism and faith in Jesus Christ our Saviour, the Son of God.

What does the Catholic Church say about respect for other Christians?

At The Second Vatican Council of 1962-65 in a decree on ecumenism it was stated: "Catholics must gladly acknowledge and esteem the truly Christian endowments from our common heritage which are to be found among our separated brethren. It is right and salutary to recognise the riches of Christ and virtuous works in the lives of others who are bearing witness to Christ, sometimes even to the shedding of their blood. For God is always wonderful in His works and worthy of all praise."



Jesus prayed for us all to be united in love for God and for one another:

"I pray that they may all be one. Father!

May they be in us, just as you are in me and I am in you.
May they be one, so that the world will believe that you sent me."
Christians of all denominations: Roman Catholics, Church of
England, Pentecostals, etc. are already united as the members of
the one Family of God through Baptism and faith in Jesus. All
agree on the central truths: that Jesus is the Son of God, that he
died and rose again and that forgiveness of sins and salvation is
through Jesus and baptism in his name.

'Churches Together' is an ecumenical organisation and there are teams in each area of the country with representative leaders from each of the different Christian Churches. They meet together to pray and plan events which help all Christians in the area to work and pray together. Eg. They might invite everyone to join in a 'Walk of Witness' through the town and pray together on Good Friday, or to work together to help a local charity such as a Night Shelter, Food Bank or other local need.

If you join in events organised by your local 'Churches Together', you are contributing to the unity of Christians

for which Jesus prayed.

We are the family of God. Is there any family that never argues? Jesus is not interested in the religious labels we give ourselves, e.g.

This is how we show that we are the family of God because we behave like Jesus as children of our Heavenly Father.

Reflection: Respect and good manners is the 1st step to loving our neighbour. Home is the school of love. Let us show love and respect by obeying our parents, carers and adults in charge of us at any time.

Father, please forgive us for the divisions we make through judging others, and the pride of our own point of view. Give us sincere openness, respect and willingness to understand other people's points of view and feelings. We pray that in the power of the Holy Spirit we may all be united in heart and mind in loving service to God and our neighbour, so that as Jesus prayed we may all be one. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

TIKTOK



TikTok is a free social media platform that lets users create, share and watch short videos ranging anywhere from 15 seconds to 10 minutes in duration. The app gained notoriety for its viral dances, trends and celebrity cameos and can be a creative, fun platform for teens to enjoy. Now available in 75 languages, it has more than a billion active users worldwide (as of spring 2022) and is most popular with the under-16 age bracket. In fact, a 2022 Ofcom report found TikTok to be the most-used social media platform for posting content, particularly among young people aged 12 to 17.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

While TikTok's "Following" lead only displays videos from users someone follows, "For You" is a stream of clips based on their previously watched content. Most videos on a child's catSOES "For You" feed will therefore be light-hearted and amusing, but it could potentially surface something unsuitable. Tithc's guidelines prohibit the sharing of lillegal or inappropriate content, but the sheer volume of uploads mean they aren't manually wonltared and vetted.

DANGEROUS CHALLENGES

Due to TikTok's Immense popularity, some young people have unfortunately been influenced by videos challenging them to perform harmful, criminal or even deadly acts. One extreme example was the 'blackout trend, which encouraged users to hold their breath until they passed out from a lack of oxygen. It led to two families filing lawsuits against TikTok over the tragic deaths of their children.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

With around 1.1 billion users globally, the potential for contact from strangers on TikTok is high – especially as accounts created by over-10s (or youngsters using a false date of birth) are set to public by default. This not only means that someone's profile is visible to everyone else on the app: it also lets their videos be suggested to others and enables anyone to comment on them or download them.

IN-APP SPENDING

TikTok is free, but users have the option to buy TikTok coins, which can be used to purchase emojis in the app. These emojis are then sent as rewards (retaining their monetary value) to other users for videos they've created. Coin bundles range from £9.99 to an eye-watering £99; TikTok's policy is that they can't be bought by under-18s, but it's possible to bypass this with a fake birthdate.

ADDICTIVE NATURE

TikTok can be addictive, especially for young people: compulsive repeated use can interfere with sleep patterns and be a distraction from other activities. The platform recently introduced default usage time limits of 60 and 100 minutes for new members under 18 (in the UK, children with TikTok average 102 minutes per day on the app), but these restrictions can easily be removed in the settings.

TIKTOK NOW

Introduced in late 2022, the 'TikTok Now' feature lets users post a daily video or photo at the exact same time as their friends. Users receive a synchronised notification at a random time of day, giving them three minutes to take a video or real-time photo. This addition can not only be a distraction to young people but could lead to them inadvertently sharing private content such as their location.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING

Family Pairing allows parents to link their TikTok account with their child's and control their settings remotely. Parents can then, for example, turn on Restricted Mode (reducing the chances of a child seeing inappropriate content); set screen time limits, and manage their child's ability to send messages (and to whom). Children can't alter these settings without parental approval.

MAKE ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

Although under-18s will have their TikTok account set to private by default, bypassing this setting is relatively easy. However, parents have the ability to manually set their child's account to private – meaning that their videos won't be visible to strangers and they won't be able to exchange messages with people who

LIMIT IN-APP SPENDING

If your child is using an iPhone or Android device to access TikTok, you can alter the settings to prevent them from making in-app purchases. We'd recommend that you enable this feature, as it's quite easy for a young person - without realising what they're doing - to spend a significant amount of real money buying TikTok coins so they can unlock more features of the app.

DISCUSS THE DANGERS

If your child wants to use TikTok and you're happy for them to do so, it's crucial to talk about the potential risks in this type of app. For example, ensure they understand not to share any identifying personal information — and that they realise they could be exposed to inappropriate content. Thinking critically about what they see on TikTok can help children become generally more social media savvy

READ THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something inappropriate or upsetting that they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the possible signs. Increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags, as are failing to complete homework or requierly not eating meals.




