#### Dear Parents/Carers,

This Sunday is World Youth Sunday, which falls on the feast of Christ The King - the last Sunday before Advent. Unlike most earthly rulers, however, Jesus was not after the title "king." He never claimed it, and actually he seemed bent on concealing his royal dignity under the appearances of a life lived in poverty and obedience to family and religious authorities.

Both 'feasts' remind me of my role as Headteacher, a title that means so many things, but I hope more than just a 'title'. I cannot claim to be concealing royal dignity (although my Irish grandfather insisted we were from the blood line of the Royal House of Tara!), but I hope that underneath my title I show the joy and privilege I feel at working with and learning with young people. On the feast of Christ the King, the Church invites young people to be at the heart of our celebration and young people are at the heart of our community.

The theme this year is 'Rejoicing in Hope'. The Christian "hope" is not a wondering if something will happen, but the "confident anticipation" of what we know will surely come to pass. Our job as Christians is to do something about that hope for others in fact it demands that we act. Our young people, sometimes I think without even realising it, act to be a beacon of hope for others in many ways: as mental health ambassadors, peer mentors, anti-bullying ambassadors, through the justice & peace group and in so many more areas of school life, and out of it. Our Christmas hampers are one area where we can offer hope - please contribute!!

It is often easy to become cynical and battle weary in education; and certainly we all feel battered and bruised on occasion, teachers and students alike. But listening to the Year 7 choir singing sublimely, or having Year 11 wave to me at my window when lining up for an exam, reminded me of the pure joy that can come unexpectedly during a wet and windy week as Winter advances, from being with young people every day.

#### Chloe at the British National Dance Championships....in Blackpool!

We were thrilled to hear from Chloe Winters' very proud grandmother that Chloe and her dance partner were to participate in the British National Dance Championships in Blackpool.

Chloe's grandmother said "this year Chloe made the decision to leave her medallist school and participate as an open competitor, and in only 10 months with lots of hard work, Chloe and her dance partner are really improving. So much so, that hopefully next year she will make the semi-final or the final!" She went on to say "Chloe's father was number one British dance champion, and fifth in the world top 10 in dance, so I guess it must be in the genes!"

As a 'wannabe' Strictly dancer with 2 left feet, I was keen to hear directly from Chloe about her dancing adventures in the home of ballroom – Blackpool. Chloe wrote a letter to Mrs Johnson thanking her for allowing the time to take part in the

British National Dance Championships in Blackpool as follows:

"Dear Mrs Johnson, thank you for allowing me to have the time off to follow my dancing passion. In this letter I will explain what is happening in the pictures. The white dress is covered in Swarovski crystals on the top layer and the skirt is ostrich feathers. I wear this dress to dance the Waltz, Tango, Foxtrot, Viennese Waltz and the Quick Step — all of which are known as ballroom dances, an elegant form of dance.

The blue dress is covered in stones and crystals as well as a huge layer of blue ostrich feathers. I wear this dress to dance the Cha-Cha, Rumba, Samba, Jive and Paso Doble – very sassy, feisty and happy dances, which are known as Latin dances.





In Blackpool my partner and I danced in different categories and age groups. In Latin, and the ballroom, we danced in the under 16's. It was very hard as my partner and I were one of the youngest of the group, however we tried our very hardest and because it was our first time in Blackpool we just enjoyed it – every single moment! Having family nearby to support us was the best thing ever, and whereas normally I would be very nervous, after all the training from all the teachers (including my dad), this boosted my confidence as well!"

I asked Chloe who her favourite was on the current Strictly show, and she said Ellie and Vito – happens to be my favourite too!!

We look forward to hearing of Chloe's future Ballroom and Latin dance successes, and who knows, one day we might be watching her on Strictly! Well done Chloe – we are so proud of you!

#### Lee Valley Athletics Semi-Finals

The Year 8 and 9 Athletics team were back in action on Wednesday night at Lee Valley, competing in the semi-finals after qualifying from last week's heats. There were 24 teams in total, all trying their best to secure a place in next week's final.

The evening started with Maja Baluka in the 60m hurdles who, despite clipping her first hurdle, managed to regain her composure and stride pattern to finish in a respectable third place in her heat and only just outside of her personal best, which she set last week. Next up was Eve Boateng in the 60m, who held her own against some very strong Year 9 athletes and finished just outside of her personal best, with a time of 9.05s.

Over in the field events Winna Koho clipped the high jump bar with her heels on her final jump, despite her soaring over the bar with the rest of her body. She still secured 4 points for the team total in a competition where every point counts. Millie Mansfield worked hard in the long jump competition after a foul jump in the first round. She kept her composure and utilised her experience to complete a best jump of 3.80m, which although was not close to her personal best, still added 14 points to the team. Her runs in both the 200m and 4 x 200m relay were a joy to watch later in the competition, where she flew around the track and demonstrated outstanding technique and speed.

As the evening went on the team continued to gather points. Ava Boucard ran an extremely tactical 800m race, shaving over 3 seconds off her personal best with her excellent pacing, finishing in 2m52.9s. Omotoyosi Odubanjo was back competing in the 300m and ran 50.1s, equalling her personal best that she set last week.

The standout performance of the evening came from Chidera Idika, who blew away the other competitors in the shotput, with a throw of 9.36m, winning the competition and adding a whopping 22 points to the team score.



At the end of the evening the girls finished in 9<sup>th</sup> position overall, earning their place in next week's B final, an outstanding achievement. With room to improve from this week's performances, they should be strong contenders.







#### Aid to the Church in Need - Red Wednesday.

Aid to the Church In Need is a Catholic charity which helps persecuted Christians and also helps people of other faiths and none who are suffering persecution in war-torn areas of the world. The ACN Red Wednesday theme this year was **BREAK THE SILENCE** of Christian Persecution. On Red Wednesday, many churches and public buildings around the world were lit up in red.

At Grays Convent we had reflective Morning Prayers and the Justice and Peace Group had a Prayer Service to pray for freedom and peace for Christians and for all who are suffering persecution for their faith.

We would like to think that Christian persecution ended centuries ago in Biblical times, but more than 200 million Christians in over 50 countries of the world are persecuted for their faith today. In some countries it is illegal to have a Bible, and people are being shot, arrested, tortured for going to Mass. They would love to have the freedom we enjoy to be able to go to Church and worship in peace. Muslims, Jews and minority faith groups also suffer persecution. At different times in History different faith groups have been persecuted. In the last year there has been a 70% increase in Christian persecution in many countries.

# What Parents & Carers Need to Know about



# SHARING PHOTOS ONLINE



WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Schools often a time-chock-full of milestones for your child, and you may well be egger to share their accomplishments with the world. Into day's digital age, sharing images of such precious moments on social media is common place, and — while that is a lovely thing to do—it does come with some risks attached. Our guide can help parents and care sto consider the potential dangers and make informed choices about safely sharing photos of their children on line.

## ONLINE GROOMING

Pictures that convey details about your child's interests, activities, or daily routines could arm an online predator with the kind of information they can deploy to gain a child's trust. They might use this knowledge to pretend to be the same age as the child or to have a shared hobby. Essentially, the more a predator knows about a young person, the easier it is for them to invent some 'common ground'.

#### PRESSURE TO PLEASE

When their parents or carers share notable moments and accomplishments in a child's life on social media, some children may begin to feel an expectation to always meet certain standards, to achieve things, or to behave in ways that are "worth sharing". Knowing that other people (even friends and family) can see these posts on social media might also add to the pressure they're feeling internally.

### IMPACT ON DIGITAL

Every photo of a child posted online contributes to their digital footprint Young people's lives have never been so closely and publicly documented as they are now, and this permanent online presence could affect a child's future opportunities or the choices they make as they grow up – in addition to influencing how they see themselves and, consequently, their emotional wellbeing.

## INVASIONS OF PRIVACY

Even with the right settings in place, absolutely nothing online is 100% private. Anyone who can view your photos could take screenshots and potentially share them elsewhere. Privacy settings are still important, though, so it's always wise to ensure your social media accounts have them set up; just bear in mind that you can't completely control what happens to anything once it's gone online.

## REVEALING PERSONAL DETAILS

Small details in photos can often reveal personal information. Backgrounds can give clues to where you live, for example, while school logos on uniforms, sports kits, or bags could help someone identify which school your child attends. With interactive maps and reverse image searches commonplace online, information like this could easily be misused by an individual with malicious intentions.

#### MISUSE OF IMAGES

Once something's been shared online, it's almost impossible to get it deleted. Photos can show up in search engine results and be downloaded, manipulated, and shared without consent. There's the potential for someone's images to be used for advertising purposes (which in many cases, isn't illegal) or even more inappropriate reasons, such as cyber-bullying or serious forms of exploitation.

# Advice for Parents & Carers

#### REVIEW SETTINGS REGULARLY

Make sure your social media's secure in terms of who can view your content or see your location (only family and trusted friends, for example). Privacy settings aren't totally foolproof, but they do make it tougher for strangers to access your pics. Reviewing your settings regularly is also a good starting point for conversations with your child about managing their own social accounts when they're older.

#### CONSIDER OTHER CHILDREN

When taking a group photo, make sure you get parents' or carers' permission to share it on social media. There may be an important safeguarding reason for them not wanting their child's photo posted publicly online, or it might simply not tally with their personal beliefs or cultural background. A quick conversation in advance, list to make sure, is usually hyagely appreciated.

#### THINK AHEAD

**CHECK YOUR PHOTOS**

Try to consider the longer-term implications of what you post. Would you be happy with that photo being online in 10 years' time? Would your child still be OK with the image when they're older? Once your child is mature enough, you could ask for their consent before posting: it respects their privacy, fosters trust and understanding, and helps them to start thinking about their own online life.






