Year 7 Revision Guide

Important information to guide you through your Exams 13th ~ 24th May 2024

















This booklet is to give you some ideas to help you with your revision and some diary pages to help you plan for your exams in the Summer term.

This guide is very helpful; make use of this when planning your revision.

Now, use the diary pages of this booklet to help you to plan your revision over the upcoming weeks. You should be aiming for at least an hour and a half each night when you are at school and 3 hours a day at weekends. Talk to your parents and family to make sure that they understand that you need to revise; you may need to plan any family events or activities into your timetable this half term.

Check that you have everything that you need to revise. Do you know what to revise for each exam?

Making a Revision Timetable

There are many good reasons to make a timetable:

- ★ Avoiding a last minute or night before rush
- **★** Setting up a routine and disciplining yourself
- * Sharing revision time between subjects
- **★** Getting the balance right between revision and leisure time

Many revision timetables do not work because they:

- **★** Cover too many weeks
- **★** Give too much detail
- **★** They are unrealistic and over-ambitious

So, here's some simple advice:

- * You know yourself; if you are unlikely to revise in the morning then plan your day around when you work best.
- ★ Work a trial timetable for one day and review it; what worked and what didn't?
- ★ Write a new daily timetable and work through it!
- * Revision sessions are best in 40 minute or 20 minute slots, so build in rest time and space subjects over the week. Revise one or two subjects each revision session and vary the subjects revised each day.

Ensure you revise in the right space

- ★ Make sure it is quiet and away from distractions
- ★ Ensure you are not isolated
- Make sure you have the right equipment: pens, pencils, cards, highlighters, folders



Organising your revision

Reading through notes is a poor way to revise so here are some ideas for how to start

- 1. Make a topic checklist: the major topics you have covered in a subject.
- 2. Put them in an order that you want to tackle them: maybe start with something you know well to boost your confidence.
- 3. Make sure you cover what you are frightened or worried about.



- 1. Pin or stick your topics up somewhere that you will see them every day and maybe so that your family can remind you and ask you about them.
- 2. Tick off your topics as you complete them to make you feel that you're getting somewhere!
- 3. Start with short periods of time if you find it tough to concentrate and build up. You might want to work on the 40/10/10 rule:

40 minutes revising
10 minutes testing
10 minutes resting
Start with 20/5/5 if it's too tough to concentrate

Some ways to revise

So, if just reading your notes is not a good way to revise what is? Be active!



Write revision notes

Read through your notes and pick out the most important points on A4 paper or revision cards. Make patterned notes or mind-maps; use pictures if you can. And especially use colour—memories are triggered by colours. Organise your notes on a wall. Or group them in different ways!

Work with a friend or study buddy

Revise a topic section each and then test each other; become the expert on an area. Write just a minute topic tests and get a friend or member of the family to test you. Compare both of your notes on a topic and then share bits you may be missing. Make sure you understand something first – before trying to remember it.

Revision Ideas & Techniques!

There are many good reasons to make a revision timetable:

Organising your revision

- Make a topic checklist: the major topics you have covered in a subject.
- Put them in an order that you want to tackle them. Maybe start with something you know well to boost your confidence.
- Make sure you cover what you are frightened or worried about.
- Pin or stick your topics up somewhere that you will see them every day and maybe so that your family can remind you and ask you about them.
- Tick off your topics as you complete your revision to make you feel that you're getting somewhere!
- Start with short periods of time if you find it tough to concentrate and build up.

Revision Technique 1: Write it all down!

- On a piece of lined paper write as much as you could write about a subject topic.
- You don't have to write full sentences, you can write down half-sentences if you need to.
- Leave gaps on the page where you know you need to add words in.

Revision Technique 2: Third Time Lucky!

- Go through your book/notes.
- On the back of a piece of paper, write down 10 words from your work which you find difficult to spell.
- Write them out three times after each word.

Revision Technique 3: Post-It Notes!

- On a Post-It note, write out two sentences you think are good OR which you think you could have trouble remembering.
- Now, read the sentences out over and over again at a normal level for about 2 minutes.
- Hide the Post-It note and write those sentences out on a different piece of paper.

Revision Technique 4: Drawings can help!

- Find 3 different sentences/words you think could be hard to remember.
- Write them out and draw a picture next to each sentence.
- Read through the sentences in your head a few times, looking at the picture too.
- Cover the sentence/word so you can only see the picture.
- Write down the sentence/word whilst looking at the picture.

Revision Technique 5: Become a Teacher!

- For one minute, tell the person sitting next to you about some sentences/formulas etc. that are important for your exam.
- How much can you remember afterwards and write down?
- Now swap so the person who was listening becomes the teacher.

Research tells us that we remember 90% of what we teach to other people.

Word	Meaning
Compare	Are the things alike or are there important differences? Which do you think is best? Why?
Contrast	Look for differences
Criticise	Use the evidence to support your opinion on the value of merit of ideas, facts or views of others
Define	Give the meaning
Describe	Write in detail
Differentiate	Explain the difference
Discuss	Write about important aspects of the topic, are there two sides to the question? Consider the arguments for and against
Distinguish	Explain the difference
Evaluate	Judge the importance of success/failure
Evaluate (Maths)	Find the numerical answer to a problem
Explain	Make clear
Illustrate	Give examples which make the point clear
Interpret	Explain the meaning in your own words, for example you may have to interpret a graph
Justify	Give reasons to support and argument of action
Outline	Choose the most important aspects of a topic. Ignore the minor details
Relate	Show the connection between things
State	Write briefly the main point
Summarise	Bring together the main points

Final Thoughts

You are not on your own ...

There are many people around you who are just as keen for you to do well as you are, so don't be afraid to ask teachers/tutors/parents for help. Your friends may well be taking the same exams – why not work together on the topics that bore you; share your thoughts about revision cards. Remember too that if you can explain something to someone else before the exam, the chances are that you can explain it in an exam as well.

Beware of other people who tell you either that they are doing very little or a great deal. The first lot may be lying to look cool; the second lot panic you into overworking! Think for yourself; don't let other people ruin your revision schedule.

Exams are not designed to catch you out; they are simply to find out what you know, what you understand and what you can do.

Make sure you have a good sleep routine, eating a healthy and balanced diet and getting some physical activity at least 3 times a week, why not head out for a walk and get someone to test you while you walk or head to the pool for a swim.

And remember, it's only a short time to sacrifice for something that you can be proud of forever. Once the exams are over, take some time to relax and celebrate your own achievements!

PERFORMANCE ASSESSMENT (first exam)

• In class we will be working on the Charlie and the Chocolate Factory scheme. For your exam you will create a devised performance based on the drama skills learnt throughout the term e.g. Freeze Frame / Thought Tracking. This performance will be marked using the usual Drama Bands. You will then be asked to evaluate the performance in controlled exam conditions.

EVALUATION OF PERFORMANCE (second exam)

- You will be asked to answer and explain Key Drama Terminology
- You will be required to complete an evaluation of your performance (see above). The questions will ask you to analyse your performance including examples

EG:

What character did you perform in your final performance? Comment on how you used voice, facial expressions and movement

How did your final performance go? Include performance examples.

How to revise – useful strategies include:

You need to prepare 4 skills (listening, reading, writing and speaking) as they will be assessed:

- Use the website listed in the above box.
- Read your exercise book and copies given. Learn from your work.
- Check PowerPoints, vocabulary and resources posted in Google classroom
- Create revision cards with the topics taught/new vocabulary learnt
- Test yourself.
- Get someone to test you.
- Go over the PowerPoints and try to do listening tasks again and try to write what you can listen.
- Pay attention to the agreements (masculine, feminine, singular, plural).
- Memorise the verb conjugation (verbs endings for each person).
- Start revising a few weeks before the exam. <u>Do not leave your revision for the last minute</u>
- As you revise with enough time, any doubts or questions go and ask your teacher.
- Sleep well the night before the exam.

You will need to be familiar with the following musical vocabulary:

DYNAMICS – how loud / quiet music is and how this changes

RHYTHM – how long/short the notes are

TEMPO – how fast/slow the music is and how this changes

PITCH - how high/low music is

MELODY – the tune! The most important part of the music

INSTRUMENTATION – the instruments you hear and how they are used

STRUCTURE – The different sections that make up a piece of music.

TEXTURE – Different layers of musical ideas

HARMONY – the musical ideas which support a melody

You should...

- be able to use these words to describe how music creates a mood or feeling;
- recognise different instruments of the orchestra and identify the families that they belong to;
- know the location of the keys on the treble-clef stave and the piano keyboard;
- know the <u>names</u> and <u>durations</u> of the different types of musical notes (i.e. semibreve, minim, crotchet, quaver, semiquaver), and be able to identify the note and the equivalent rest.

Using YouTube you will find a variety of videos that introduce and demonstrate different instruments of the orchestra and there are also listening tests that will test your ability to identify instruments when they are playing.

Listen to a **VARIETY** of different music – not just your favourite songs! Ask friends and family to share with you their favourites, you might find music that you enjoy!

How to revise – useful strategies include:

Make sure you know the musical elements keywords at the top of this page.

Choose a short section of a piece of music (around 45 seconds) to listen to. Write down as much as you can about each of these top 6. For example, what are the dynamics and do they change? What instruments can you hear playing?

Describe the mood of the music as musically as possible.

How to revise – useful strategies include:

You need to prepare 4 skills (listening, reading, writing and speaking) as they will be assessed:

- Use the website listed in the above box.
- Read your exercise book and copies given. Learn from your work.
- Check PowerPoints, vocabulary and resources posted in Google classroom.
- Create revision cards with the topics taught/new vocabulary learnt.
- Test yourself.
- Get someone to test you.
- Go over the PowerPoints and try to do listening tasks again and try to write what you can listen.
- Pay attention to the agreements (masculine, feminine, singular, plural)
- Memorise the verb conjugation (verbs endings for each person).
- Start revising a few weeks before the exam. Do not leave your revision for the last minute
- As you revise with enough time, any doubts or questions go and ask your teacher.
